Log Cabin Rescue

Janesville had acquired an Amish log cabin, but no one was sure what to do with it! The CmPS team from Edison Middle School used their problem solving skills to come up with some answers. The nineteen team members organized themselves to create an educational coloring book, instructional materials for teachers, and a video depicting pioneer life. Research, art, writing, and word processing talent were in high demand as students researched pioneer life and cabin construction, drew pictures of their research and of the cabin before it was disassembled for transport, and created a story combining their pictures and information into a coloring book. Instructional materials for teachers included background information on many aspects of pioneer life, games and activities for students, and cooking recipes. The students wrote a video script and requested permission to film at Old World Wisconsin. They also plan to do fund raising to assist with the reconstruction of the cabin. Teachers



who have previewed the materials can't wait to get them! These projects will greatly enhance the education of elementary students who study the history of Janesville and Wisconsin.

1996-1997

Enlivening Head Start

The Head Start program in Fort Atkinson was forced to relocate to an older building with aging play equipment. Enter the Fort Atkinson High School CmPSers with plans to enliven the daily environment for the young students! The team of four wrote and received a grant to fund portions of their project. They divided tasks among themselves to accomplish their ambitious goals. During the year, the CmPS team purchased large pieces of indoor play equipment for the program, to enhance students' large motor development. They painted a large wall mural and smaller alphabet depictions, to be both colorful and educational. They presented a skit for the students about helping others. The students secured donations for a parent resource library, and recruited Spanish classes to write storybooks for the Spanish-speaking students at Head Start. The efforts of the team were presented at a local community group, and even mobilized a parent group to work for further improvements. The Head Start students have been greatly enrichment by the efforts of this CmPS team.

Adopt-a-Park Program

Janesville is proud of its nickname – The City of Parks. It has more park acreage than any other city in Wisconsin. After some initial surveys and an interview with the city parks director, the Janesville Edison CmPS team realized that only a handful of the 60+ parks were actually used by citizens. Because of this, the same parks received needed improvements. The parks department also had its budget severely cut. The CmPS team began photographing and gathering information about the needs of smaller, less used neighborhood parks, and began

promoting an Adopt-a-Park program. Students designed an informational brochure that was mailed to over 500 businesses and organizations. The photographs were organized into a catalog of the 32 neediest parks. A contract, worksheet, and evaluation form for groups to use when they adopted a park were developed. Teams of students began making presentations to organizations, the city council, and on the radio. A web site was created to explain the project. To date 15 parks have been adopted, with more pending. The amount of money and labor that this program will save the community will be amazing.

1997-1998

Readiness at Head Start

Improving the school readiness for Head Start children, with a special focus on bilingual Spanish speaking students, was the goal of the Fort Atkinson Senior CmPS students. Team members sought funding from local civic groups, recycled older but usable computers, set up a Spanish lending library, developed a learning and listening center, and organized parent reading and technology nights. A prime objective was to integrate their volunteer time into the lives of the students through involvement with reading or projects such as planting.



Childhood Literacy

The Pecatonica CmPS team worked with the district media and reading specialists and Blanchardville librarian to improve early literacy in the children of the Hollandale and Blanchardville communities. With the help of the reading specialist, the team members sponsored a workshop for parents that stressed the importance of reading to young children and provided strategies to parents for improving literacy in their children. Pre-school story times were offered at the public library by the team members and by volunteer National Honor Society members. Members also assisted the reading specialist with the Books for Tots program. During the summer months, team members served as reading tutors for primary students needing help in maintaining their reading skills.

HELP for Middle Schoolers

The Luxemburg-Casco High School CmPS team determined that there is a need to better prepare middle school students for success at the high school level. It appeared the best way to achieve such goals would be to create a tutoring program at the middle school. In addition to tutoring in academic

areas, emphasis is placed on good study habits, organization skills, and self-confidence. An FPS program for 7th and 8th graders was also started to encourage creative thinking and participation in extra-curricular activities. Allowing students to get involved in school activities at an earlier age may increase the success of the students at the high school level. Each program has had success in its early stages, and there have been many positive effects on all those involved. The program has been set up for sustainability and will continue to thrive in the future.



Imagine All the People

Due to the growing number of ethnic minority children entering the Fort Atkinson School District, high school team members saw a need for increasing multicultural awareness in our community. Because they felt the most important way to improve our world is to cherish our similarities, an exchange program was established between the three elementary schools in Fort Atkinson and a primary school in Kingston, Jamaica. Each team member adopted a classroom in which they coordinated a cultural exchange for fourth grade students. The project connected to the reading and



language arts curriculum through the preparation of a classroom book, a box of cultural artifacts, and the preparation of pen pal letters. Three team members traveled to Kingston to work with 10-year-old Jamaican students in preparing similar materials for the exchange. Team members also prepared an early childhood training manual for the Jamaican teachers.

1999-2000

Into Africa

State Bowl: Middle Division, 1st Place International Conference: Middle Division, Grand Champion

Through "Into Africa," team members from Edison Middle School in Janesville have been supporting Peace Corps member and former FPSer, Alyson Carr, in Namibia, Africa for two years. Alyson is working with teachers in five schools helping them teach English. Namibia has few educational resources, so the team committed themselves to helping improve the education in Alyson's schools. Students sent maps, handmade flash cards, playground balls, homemade jump ropes, and tons of school supplies and books. They prepared phonics materials and collected hundreds of t-shirts. They set up a writing project between third graders in Janesville and Namibia. Third graders wrote letters and sent Valentines and plastic Easter eggs. The team raised \$5000 for the postage to send the resources to Namibia.

Project YOUTH

High school students from Luxemburg-Casco recognized a generation gap between Elders and Teens, but felt that each group has a wealth of knowledge to share with each other. Through Project YOUTH (Young and Old Understanding Their History), the team increased opportunities for social interaction between elders and teens, in order to better establish a mutual understanding. Teens met with Elders to share stories and experiences with one another. The team organized projects involving education, entertainment, and history that brought the whole community together.

1999-2000

Adult Computer Literacy

State Bowl: Senior Division, 2nd Place



In response to the problem of inadequate technology education for adults in rural areas, the Community Problem Solving team from Pecatonica High School in Blanchardville accepted the challenge to make some changes. Their best solution was to offer a series of evening computer classes. They began with very basic sessions for adults who had never used a computer before. Other sessions taught basic word processing and managing windows skills. The response was so overwhelming that by the third session the class had to be divided into two sections and a second computer lab used. Additional classes focused on the Internet, searching techniques, and specific application programs.

2000-2001

Project H.E.L.P.

Fort Atkinson High School Coach: Vicki Wright

State Bowl: Senior Division, 1st Place

Attacking the problem of latchkey children, who come home to an empty house after school, the Fort Atkinson Community Problem Solving Team established the Homework and Educational Learning Program (H.E.L.P.). The first step in the implementation of the program was forming a partnership with St. Peter's Episcopal Church, which was interested in a community outreach project. Community Problem Solving members then consulted with the school superintendent regarding the legal aspects associated with developing an after-school program. Getting started required finding and hiring a supervisor, purchasing supplies, recruiting volunteers, determining rules, finalizing a schedule, and making parent contacts. After two successful semesters of H.E.L.P. with students from one



elementary school in Fort Atkinson, it was expanded to another set of days and a satellite program at another elementary school in Fort Atkinson. The program is now running successfully and is planned to continue for several years into the future.

2000-2001

Teen Center

Pecatonica High School, Blanchardville Coach: Irene Middlemas

In the small rural communities of Blanchardville and Hollandale there are few recreational and educational activities available for elementary and middle school students once the school day has ended. Many students of this age group are unsupervised for several hours after school. The Pecatonica High School CmPS team decided to address this problem by setting the long-term goal of establishing a youth center in Blanchardville. Recognizing it would take a great deal of time and money to reach this goal, the team members decided to start with the first phase of the project. This included starting an after-school youth club for 5th - 8th graders, which was held twice a month. Activities included Tae Kwon Do, science experiments, art projects, and cooking. The CmPS team members also participated in a mentor-training workshop. The team applied for and received a mini-grant from the Department of Public Instruction to fund this project.

STEPS: Spanish Teaching to Erase Prejudicial Segregation

In recent years, the population of Spanish speaking residents in the community of Fort Atkinson has increased. In order to bridge the gap between the two cultures in our city, we undertook a multi-faceted project. In the schools, we hung signs in Spanish in common places, such as bathrooms and the library. We bought books in Spanish for the libraries. Team members taught English-speaking elementary students basic Spanish. We sponsored Spanish classes for staff and teachers to improve communication with parents and students. A Spanish Reading Fiesta was held for all students. We are



helping our community take "S.T.E.P.S" toward breaking cultural barriers.

2001-2002

Computer Literacy for Rural Adults

The Pecatonica CmPS team members decided to help improve computer literacy in the adult population of their rural community. They applied for and received a \$12,000 Youth Connecting Communities grant to help fund the three-year project and servicelearning training for the team. The group has held several series of computer classes and workshops. Several members of the community have helped by presenting at some of these workshops. The CmPSers will be helping local business owners computerize their records and promote their businesses via the Internet. With the help of area agencies, future classes will target the elderly and single parents.

Promoting Life Activity in Youth

Given that many children in the school district tend to make unhealthy nutritional and lifestyle choices, the Luxemburg-Casco Community Problem Solving Team created a project called PLAY, Promoting Life Activity in Youth. The program targets fourth and fifth grade students in the Intermediate School. Through fun-filled sessions and organized activities, held weekly for over a year, PLAY teaches children the importance of healthy food choices, moderation when eating, regular exercise, and the dangers of alcohol, drugs, and



tobacco. Walk Across America, nutrition logs, a healthy kid's cookbook, and a reward program for purchasing healthy foods at the local grocery store were some highlights. The team hopes to instill healthy habits for the students to carry with them throughout their lives.

2002-2003

Multicultural Awareness

The Pecatonica CmPS team members noticed that their community was lacking in cultural diversity, and that students had few opportunities to gain an understanding of other cultures. In order to promote this understanding, the team connected with school groups in Chaco Province, Argentina. They conducted fundraisers to directly support education in Chaco Province, and communicated with through the schools to learn about the lives of the children. Presentations to fourth grade students were conducted to get them involved in the project and to learn in a "firsthand" way about the lives of children in another culture, as well as to see what a difference we can make for others.

Partners in Global Solutions

North High School, Appleton and Schuchye, Russia Coach: Marlyce Reed & Masha Byvakina

State Bowl: Senior Division, 1st Place International Conference: Senior Civic & Cultural Division, 1st Place IC Beyonder Award



What inspiration we all felt as we listened to eight students from Appleton and four students from Russia talk about their efforts to keep the Russian citizens of Schuchye safe from a nearby stockpile of chemical weapons. The comparison of safety measures in effect in the United States versus Russia was very powerful in highlighting the significance of the problems. Led by coaches Marlyce Reed and Masha Byvakina, the students made extensive contacts with officials in both countries while researching and implementing solutions to the dangerous situation in Russia. The team split up duties appropriate to each of their locations, and worked together tirelessly on their project. We were thrilled to welcome the Russian team to our State Bowl in

April. In addition to presenting their CmPS project, the Russian students participated in both the team booklet and skit competitions. The team implemented these solutions:

- Effective warning system As a gift from the city of Appleton, the team presented the leaders of Schuchye with a large warning siren
- Obtain gas masks The team set us a SASY website for donations that were used to obtain gas masks to supplement those on hand. These were distributed to residents.
- Evacuation plan Although an evacuation plan existed, the residents were not aware of it. Using software from local resources, the plan was elaborated. Residents were provided with magnets giving directions for evacuation.
- Practice drills The team initiated practice drills at the nearby Green Cross camp.
- Public education Many residents were uninformed about the chemical weapons threat. Package labeling for children was designed to provide factual information.

UPDATE: As of March 2013, all of the chemical weapons in the stockpile had been destroyed!



New Student Welcome

As a 3-5 school, every year all of the 3rd graders are new to the school. In addition, new students also come from many cultures and speaking other languages. The team wanted to create a stronger feeling of welcome for all new students. They gathered data from surveys in three languages, the past and current principal, a parent group, many alumni, and the school archives. They asked the PTO for help with funding, and presented their plans to students and parents at a school carnival. To implement their plan, they created

a welcome video highlighting the history of Randall School and what it is like today. They also created welcome postcards and Randall t-shirts for all new students.

We hoped that by offering the students different project options, such as painting murals, visiting the elderly, collecting teddy bears, or raking the lawns of community members, they would be likely to volunteer for one or more of these projects. The response to these projects has been excellent, and the students are now very eager to help.




2006-2007

We used money from our fundraising efforts to provide scholarships to students planning to major in the fine arts.

Imagine Initiating Multiculturalism Among Great youth In order to Never stop seeking Equality

In the rural village of Waunakee, Wisconsin, the number of residents of multicultural backgrounds has been steadily increasing since 1990. Ten years ago multicultural students composed only 1.8 percent of the student population, and today they make up 4.9 percent. A need for Project IMAGINE – Initiating Multiculturalism Among Great Interested youth who Need Equality was identified as a result of the limited knowledge white students of the Waunakee Community School district have of people with multicultural backgrounds. A multicultural club, field trips, and guest presentations addressed the goal of fostering inter-racial dialogue and creating a more accepting atmosphere within the district.



Some of our team members became concerned about the personal safety of fellow students when they noticed bullying and harassment occurring among our students, especially on Facebook. The slogan "Be the Hero" was chosen to encourage bystanders to step up and intervene when they witness cases of bullying.


